Curriculum

Our Curriculum Aims and Values

By the time they leave St Alban's, our aim is that all children are confident, articulate, engaged with the world around them and eager to make a difference. We value each person's qualities as a unique child of God, and model values of inclusion and community, as well as care for the planet.

Our curriculum is designed to give children the knowledge and skills that enable them to fulfil the St Alban's motto "Lead the way" in many diverse ways. In learning we model high aspirations built upon a strong ethical framework, and underpinned by an understanding of the value of resilience and determination. We encourage curiosity and signpost opportunities to extend learning in all topics through further research.

Our curriculum considers what our children, living on the edge of London, uniquely need. The following themes underpin our intent:

Building life skills: We want a curriculum where learning is given purpose and subject skills and knowledge are applied meaningfully through real life experiences.

Creating community: We have children of many nationalities. We want to build tolerance and respect and we also want to create citizens who combine their knowledge with the wisdom and understanding that comes from real life experience. Our school motto is 'Lead the Way'. We want to build the children's capacity for leadership from a young age so that they can go on to be leaders for a sustainable future.

Caring for our common home: We actively discuss the Encyclical Letter 'Laudato Si' and 'Fratelli Tutti' from Pope Francis on how to care for our common home. We want all our children to be aware of the importance of looking after the world around us and teach them how they can do this through their everyday actions. Children need to know that they have a huge part to play as agents of change to our world.

Religious Education and Collective Worship

St. Alban's Catholic Primary School is a community where the spiritual, moral, cultural and personal worlds within which we live are harmonised to form the roots which grow our values, motivation, aspirations and the moral imperatives that inform our choices and actions as persons.

When pupils join our school, they become part of this community and each individual embarks upon their own spiritual journey. Every day, we begin with an Act of Worship, where we give thanks to God. We also pray before lunch and we end the day with a prayer.

We believe that Christ is at the centre of all we do and therefore we offer each child a broad, balanced and relevant curriculum of the highest standard to meet their spiritual, emotional, moral, intellectual and physical needs and to prepare them for the responsibilities of adult life.

The programme of Religious Education we follow is in line with the Diocese of Arundel & Brighton and the Catholic Directory as specified by the Bishops Conference of England and Wales. Our Mission Statement is embedded within all aspects of school life and provides the foundations for decisions and actions made by all members of our school community.

Curriculum

We have excellent links with our parish church, St Barnabas, with the parish priest making regular visits to the school as part of our pastoral programme. All pupils attend whole school masses either at St. Barnabas or at school on special occasions including Christmas and on St Alban's Feast Day. The parish priest also celebrates mass at the school throughout the year.

Our school motto "Lead the Way" provides our pupils with a clear direction and approach to life, whereby we encourage each and every pupil to be a leader and role model. Inspired by the Saints, we model high aspirations built upon a strong ethical framework, and underpinned by an understanding of the value of resilience and determination.

National Curriculum

English

Reading is at the very core of English teaching. Children starting school learn to read fluently and confidently through daily phonics sessions using resources from the Read Write Inc phonics scheme. English teaching across the school is rooted in the use of quality texts to inspire children to develop their own writing skills. We have a well-stocked school library as well as book corners in every classroom all of which are updated regularly. Throughout the school English teaching encourages children to become confident and articulate communicators in speech and the written word.

Maths

We strive to ensure that children are developing maths skills which can be applied to real-life situations; a passion for maths and problem solving and the confidence to apply their skills to unfamiliar problems and use reasoning skills to tackle these. We aim to maximise the reasoning and problem solving opportunities available to children as well as providing enough fluency practise that children are able to use their arithmetic skills quickly to solve problems.

Science

We aim to inspire a lifelong love of science in children, by balancing the acquisition of a secure base of knowledge and skills, and the opportunity for children to investigate and theorise for themselves. We hold a much-loved annual Science week, in which children across the school spend a week focusing on a particular area of science that will extend their understanding of both our scientific heritage and the relevance of science to our everyday lives.

Other subjects

We teach the full primary curriculum, with links to the local area wherever relevant. For instance in history lessons we learn about the impact of Henry VIII's reign on the growth of the local area, from the impact of Hampton Court to the destruction of Chertsey Abbey. We enjoy regular external workshops to enrich the children's understanding of subjects, as well as a varied programme of school trips. We encourage children to undertake their own research on areas of the curriculum that are of particular interest to them. "Teacher's of St. Alban's endeavour to provide a school day which excites, challenges and motivates each individual child".

Curriculum

Sporting Aims and Provision for Sport

Physical Education (PE) aims to provide an enjoyable, satisfying and balanced programme, with opportunities for all pupils to develop physically, socially, emotionally and cognitively.

The PE curriculum offers a breadth of experiences to meet these individual needs through a range of sports including gymnastics (floor and apparatus), dance, games (bat and ball, small ball and large ball team activities), athletics (track and field activities) hockey and swimming.

Additional Needs

Teaching staff are continuously alert to any additional needs that a child may have throughout the course of their time here at St Alban's. This may take the form of a need for additional learning support, emotional or psychological support or special provisions for children with physical disabilities.

Children's individual needs will be assessed and discussed with parents. Any special provisions will be specific to the needs of the child. Parents will be involved in discussing and reviewing provision made for children with special needs in line with the SEND Code of Practice.

Educational Visits

Visits will be arranged to extend the work children do in school. We request that parents contribute to school trips, events and workshops. A copy of the Charges and Remissions Policy is available on the school website or upon request.

Please note that parents of pupils who meet the Free School Meals eligibility criteria are only expected to make a contribution of 10% for school trips.

RSHE

A scheme of work for Relationship ,Sex and Health Education has been implemented throughout the school. See the Relationship, Sex and Health Education (RSHE) Policy on our website for details. Our RSHE programme, Journey In Love, provides extensive opportunities to discuss personal development. These are also shared on our website so all parents have access to support what we are teaching. "School sports allow children to recognise sport as enjoyable and gain confidence in their own ability".

Extra Curricular Activities

St Alban's offers a number of after school clubs primarily run by third parties. The current list can be seen below. These activities are either paid for via the ScoPay online payment system or directly to the third party.

Music tuition and instrument hire is provided by Surrey Arts and Scales & Tales during the school day.

Behaviour

At St Alban's, we believe that everyone is of equal value. Sanctions, if necessary, will focus on the behaviour, not the child and we will actively seek peace, reconciliation and harmony, looking to Christ as our guide.

All parents and staff are automatically members of our Home School Association called "The Friends of St Alban's" (FoSA). They organise a number of social and fundraising activities each year and their AGM is held each September.

Communication

A newsletter will be sent to parents regularly, keeping them informed about school activities.

Should parents feel that something is not working as well as they would wish, they should make an appointment to discuss their concerns with the Headteacher initially. Getting Ready For School

Experiences children have in the early years of their life will have a huge impact on their future wellbeing and successes.

Parents are crucial to this and , time and time again, research proves that children who feel safe, secure and loved are more receptive to and involved in learning.

We all want to prepare children as best we can for when they start school. The more prepared they are, the easier it will be for them to settle in and make the most of all the opportunities that going to school will offer.

To help you and your children become members of our school community, we run a **"Getting Ready for School"** programme in the term before children start school. New parents will be informed of the details of this scheme at the New Reception Parent's Meeting that is run by the Headteacher.

Children will be invited in to meet their reception teacher, share a story and have a tour of the school.

Children are placed in mixed ability classes. Children are taught most subjects by their class teacher who is also responsible for their pastoral care.

St. Alban's Breakfast & After School Club Provision

St Alban's runs a very popular Breakfast and After School Club.

Opening Hours

The Breakfast and After School Clubs run Monday to Friday every week during term time.

Breakfast Club operates from 7.40am to the start of the school day, when the children will go into school.

After School Club operates from the end of the school day to 6.00pm.

Please Note:

The clubs will not open on Bank Holidays and inset days. The After School club will not operate on the last day of each full term when the school closes early. A waiting list system operates when demand exceeds our capacity and parents will be contacted once a place becomes available.

Current fees for the club

Breakfast Club = £5.50 (Fee includes Breakfast) After School Club = £12.50 (Fee includes a healthy snack and a drink) A £6 discount will be applied for those children booked in both clubs all week. "We value our relationship with parents and carers, and are committed to working in partnership with you to provide top quality play and care for your children".

Safety

Please ensure that you keep to the footpath when walking down the school drive.

Parents' cars should not be brought onto site unless collecting sick children. If you do need to bring your car on site, please drive very slowly.

Please ensure, when parking outside, that the gates are left clear so children can leave the school grounds and cross the road safely and that you do not block local residents driveways.

Health

Please let us know if your child has a serious, or recurring medical problem so we can take the appropriate action. If your child suffers from asthma, epilepsy or diabetes, please arrange with the school office for the appropriate medication to be kept in school.

Staff are only permitted to administer medication with a prescription, including Calpol, antihistamines and sun cream, and need to have parental permission in advance. Parents are asked to download and fill in a Medicine Consent Form from the website. Please give this to the school office who will arrange for the child to come to the school office to take their medicine at the correct time

Punctuality and Attendance

It is important that your child gets a good start to each day. It is disruptive for them and their classmates if they are late, so you are asked to ensure that they arrive in school on time. We are required by the Department for Education to keep a record of absences.

Any absence for which we are given no explanation is classed as an unauthorised absence (or truancy). If your child is unwell, please notify the school on the first day of absence and every subsequent day they are off. Permission for holidays in term time is only granted in exceptional circumstances. For further details, please refer to our Attendance Policy available on our school website.

Food

Cooked meals are available at a cost of £2.70 per day. Dinner money should be paid in advance. The method of payment is through ScoPay, our online payments system. Details on how to pay for school dinners will be communicated to parents before your child starts school.

Administration

Food continued

Children may bring a packed lunch in a lunchbox that is clearly marked with their name and class. Only waxed cartons or plastic bottles of drink should be included with packed lunches.

Cans, glass bottles and fizzy drinks are not allowed. Children are encouraged to eat a healthy diet and to drink plenty of water during the school day.

We are a 'nut free' school, so please ensure that no nuts or products containing nuts are ever included in your child's lunch box.

All infants are given a small piece of fruit in the morning break and all under 5s will be given free milk. Children over 5 can opt to continue with milk, but parents must pay for this unless they qualify for free school meals. The school will collect any allergy information relating to new pupils to ensure that they are not given any food products that they have an intolerance to. All children may bring fruit in from home for a snack at morning break time. Sweets, chocolate, and chewing gum are not permitted in school.

Free School Meals

All children in Key Stage 1 (Reception to Year 2) automatically qualify for a free school meal. This is regardless of whether their parents qualify under the Free School Meals eligibility criteria. Junior children may qualify for a free school meal, if their parent or carer is in receipt of certain benefits. If you think that your child may qualify for free school meals, please speak to the staff in the school office who will assist you. Your information will be treated in the strictest confidence.

School Development Fund

The School Development Fund is made up from contributions from parents and supports the school in the funding of larger projects, a recent example being the playground extension with sunken pirate ship and trim trail. These projects help make a difference to your child and provide a lasting legacy for current and future pupils.

The governors have suggested a contribution of £10 per month per family, but if you can afford more it would be very much appreciated. Contributions can be made weekly, monthly, termly or annually.

We would like you to also consider registering for the Gift Aid Scheme, to give us an extra income from the Inland Revenue at no extra cost to yourself.
